An international symposium at the Karolinska University Hospital in Stockholm, Sweden, with a new format for sustained release of ideas and thoughts

It is always difficult to foresee what will happen – and yet it is so important to be prepared for the future. Regarding pancreatology (like many other parts of medicine) the progress has been extraordinary the last 40 years. At the start of this era there were small possibilities to diagnose pancreatic diseases until they were so advanced that curative treatment was not possible. Today, also early stages of the disease are possible to diagnose and some precursors of severe diseases may be identified, the genetics of some diseases are beginning to discern, the imaging of disease make the planning of treatment possible to tailor better than ever before, some illnesses that was not possible to cure can now be treated with or without surgery, and all patient can be palliated to some extent. However, it is not probable that the progress will stop tomorrow – rather there is a good chance that we will see new opportunities that we just some years ago could not even imaging. This is what this symposium is all about: what can we expect for the nearest future.

It has been invited the crème de la crème of pancreatology, and of course this is the least we need when we discuss the future – less would make the discussions impossible. However, when this elite is present it implies that time is limited as this caliber of pancreatologist need more than 25 hours per day from the patients' point of view. Therefore, the discussions are the important part, and the short lectures are only intended to be the starting points for the discussion.

The format of the symposium is:

- A written part
- A meeting part
- A re-written part

Focus will be on the discussions, and all the lecturers will be thoroughly questioned by the young pancreatologists who also serve as moderatrors. The titles and the moderators for November 21 is (but everything may be changed if better ideas are presented).
